TYPES OF ASSISTANCE

NRCS provides free technical assistance to all agricultural producers. For all programs, producers must control or own the land and be in compliance with highly erodible land and wetland conservation requirements and, in some states, sodsaver provisions; additional requirements are unique to each program. ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY INCENTIVES PROGRAM ORGANIC INITIATIVE

EQIP provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers to help plan and implement conservation practices that address natural resource concerns and for opportunities to improve soil, water, plant, animal, air and related resources on agricultural land. To qualify for the Organic Initiatives, producers must be certified organic, transitional, or exempt from certification. Payments are made to eligible participants after conservation practices and activities identified in an EQIP plan are implemented. Contracts can be up to \$20,000 annually, and/or up to \$80,000 over a six-year contract.
