# **Conservation Reserve Program General Signup Announced**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will accept new offers to participate in CRP under a general signup to be held Dec. 1, 2015, through Feb. 26, 2016.

- Eligible existing program participants with contracts expiring Sept. 30, 2015, will be granted an option for one-year extensions.
- Farmers and ranchers interested in removing sensitive land from agricultural production and planting grasses or trees to reduce soil erosion, improve water quality and restore wildlife habitat are encouraged to enroll.

The voluntary Conservation Reserve Program allows USDA to contract with agricultural producers so that environmentally sensitive land is conserved. Participants establish long-term, resource-conserving plant species to control soil erosion, improve water quality and develop wildlife habitat. In return, USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) provides participants with rental payments and cost-share assistance. Contract duration is between 10 and 15 years.

Farmers and ranchers are encouraged to consider the various CRP continuous signup initiatives that may help target specific resource concerns.

- Examples of practices are conservation buffers and pollinator habitat plantings.
- Initiatives include the highly erodible lands, bottomland hardwood tree and longleaf pine.

The 2014 Farm Bill authorized the enrollment of grasslands in CRP and information on grasslands enrollment will be available after the regulation is published later this summer.
