Reasons for proceeding with design and land acquisition of Pigeon/Jones Site #15 Project from the perspective of State NRDF (Natural Resources Development Fund) funding by the Nebraska Natural Resources Commission (Commission) are as follows:

- 1. State Commission only able to approve and allocate funds toward additional projects up to \$9.5m, due to legislative set cap. See attached (1.).
- 2. On July 11, 2007, the Commission chose to approve two projects and allocate funds toward one project. See attached (2.):

Note: The Lake Wanahoo Project, that was approved and received an allocation of \$9.5m, included reimbursement for final design and land rights costs that had already been expended. Also, they received no funding (obligation).

- 3. Minutes of the July 11, 2007 Commission meeting reflect that the P/J Site 15 Project will be the next one funded. See attached (3.).
- 4. The NRDF application spelled out that final design of the dams, levee and roads would occur in the first year followed by land acquisition in year two. Final Design must precede land acquisition, so know for sure what to acquire. Landowners are in a quandary, unable to determine whether or not to improve their properties, until acquisition occurs. See attached (4.).
- 5. At current legislative funding levels of about \$3.5m per year. The Commission would be able to allocate the \$6.5m needed for the P/J Site 15 Project in two years (July 2009). This would line up with the time just before starting construction of any facilities. This would also fall in line with the precedent set by the Lake Wanahoo Project where design and land rights were reimbursed after the fact. See attached (5.).

- 6. At this time it is not recommended that the District proceed with construction until after the Commission has at least allocated funds toward the P/J Site 15 Project (which again would probably be in 2 years, July 2009). However, as is the case with Lake Wanahoo, funds still would probably not be available for the project for a few years after that. There is an \$18m backlog of projects (\$24m figuring NRD estimated cost increases) which at the current level of legislative appropriations of \$3.5m per year will take 5 to 7 years, respectively, to fulfill. This points out the urgent need to approach the legislature for additional funding in the NRDF program. See attached (6.).
- 7. Last, but not least, this project has already been planned for seven years. The project will take 4 to 5 years to implement if all goes well. Further delays will only increase costs and strain goodwill efforts. See attached timeline (7.).

The meeting was called to order by Commission Chair Wayne Madsen in the North Platte Natural Resources District's conference room in Scottsbluff, Nebraska, at 9:10 a.m.

Notice of the meeting was published in the SCOTTSBLUFF STARR HERALD on July 1, 2007, and in the LINCOLN JOURNAL STAR on July 2, 2007.

INFORMATIONAL MATERIAL

The following items of informational materials were distributed during the course of the meeting and a copy of each is attached to the file copy of the minutes:

And therefore resolves that:

- (1) The Lake Wanahoo Project is eligible for funding from the Nebraska Resources Development Fund; actual funding being subject to the condition that the money required from the Fund is available and based on applying the assessment system for obligating funds;
- (2) The funding, if and when provided, should be in the form of a grant for up to \$9,204,000, not to exceed 60% of the eligible local share of project cost currently estimated by the sponsor to be \$15,340,000, including feasibility study costs of \$250,000:
- (3) The funding is contingent upon the securement of local cost-share funds and no NRDF funds can be obligated to the project until the local funding is secured; and
- (4) The Director of Natural Resources is authorized to negotiate and enter into a contract with the Lower Platte North NRD for carrying out the conditions for the utilization of NRDF funds for the project.

Marlin Petermann, Assistant Manager, Papio NRD requested that the Pigeon/Jones Creek project be the next project to receive allocation from the NRDF, and that the Commission approve the project sponsor's request to proceed with project work recognizing such expenditures in advance of allocating funds be allowed for later cost-share. Petermann stated that the NRD intends to proceed with final design and obtain land rights.

Johannes reminded the Commission that it committed to both Lake Wanahoo and Pigeon/Jones Creek projects that:

- Both are excellent projects that would be assets to the State;
- Both would be considered at the same time;
- Neither would be subjected to the project ranking process prior to the Commission taking action on each project's application; and,
- Nothing precludes projects initially approved at zero allocation from requesting and receiving subsequent allocation increases.

Johannes added that the Commission had just changed rules and modified the project ranking process which will allow the sponsors of the Pigeon/Jones Creek project to be considered for an increase in allocation if and when money becomes available under the cap. Moore added that there is a spirit of competition between districts competing for funds and that the two districts should be complemented for being willing to work together for the greater good.

Motion was made by Johannes and seconded by Watermeier that the Natural Resources Commission having reviewed and considered the recommendation of the Department of Natural Resources, hereby makes the following findings of fact:

- (1) The Pigeon/Jones Creek Project will be of general public benefit;
- (2) The project plan does not conflict with any existing state land plan;
- (3) The project has been determined to be technically, economically, and financially feasible and environmentally acceptable according to the Resources Development Fund criteria;



- (4) The plan for development is satisfactory:
- (5) The plan minimizes any adverse impacts on the natural environment;
- (6) The Papio-Missouri River Natural Resources District is qualified, responsible, and legally capable of carrying out the project;
- (7) Other plans and programs of the state were taken into consideration in preparing the plan of development in accordance with section 84-135, and resources development plans of the political subdivisions of the state were considered; and,
- (8) The project will not jeopardize the continued existence of any threatened or endangered species or modify or destroy the habitat of any such species.

And therefore resolves that:

- (1) The Pigeon/Jones Creek Project is eligible for funding from the Nebraska Resources Development Fund; actual funding being subject to the condition that the money required from the Fund is available and based on applying the assessment system for obligating funds; and,
- (2) Due to the unavailability of funds that can be allocated by the Commission, this project is approved but with \$0 allocation. In accordance with the revised rules adopted today but subject to the Governor's approval, the sponsor may request that this project be reconsidered at any point during the next four years for an increased allocation,

Zimmerman reviewed three Small Watershed Flood Control Fund Status Reports. The first dated May 21, 2007, corrected a previous error in which the FY 2007 base was listed as \$700,000 while the Commission had set the base at \$800,000. The second report included Fiscal Year end Expenditures, and the third listed the proposed base of \$321,600 to cover the Lower Big Blue NRD's request for fee title purchase of a tract of land associated with Site 8 of the Lower Turkey Creek Watershed Project. The table summarizing the project sponsor's projected FY2008 funding requests was also reviewed.

Motion was made by Johannes and seconded by Kramper to establish the Revolving Fund Base for the Small Watersheds Flood Control Fund at \$321,600 for Fiscal Year 2008. There was no discussion. Motion carried.

Richters pointed out that in August there will be a Water Quality Fund distribution to the NRDs and that the paper work for recertification was starting to come in.

Motion was made by Johannes and seconded by Donaldson to approve continued use of the following distribution formula for the Nebraska Soil and Water Conservation Program Funds for FY 2008: \$1,000,000 distributed equally among the 23 NRDs and the distribution of any additional available funds based on the NRI formula previously adopted by the Commission.

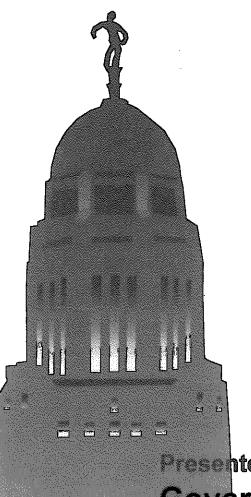

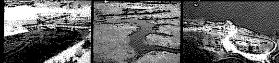

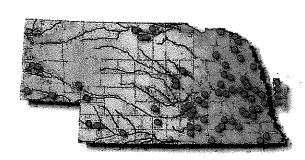

Project Review

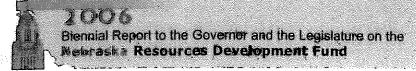
As of June 30, 2006, **68 water resources projects** have been approved for financial assistance from the Resources Development Fund. The **total allocation for these projects is \$81,514,082.65**. The majority of the projects funded provide for the storage of water and the beneficial use(s) of that water. Flood damage reduction, sediment and erosion control, groundwater recharge, irrigation water management, fish and wildlife enhancement, and recreation, including fishing, boating, and swimming, have been the primary benefits that have resulted. Several of the funded projects were planned through the Natural Resources Conservation Service's P.L. 566 Watershed Program, its Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Program, or the Corps of Engineers' Section 205 Flood Control Program. **During fiscal years 2005 and 2006, two projects were completed, three project applications were approved for NRDF assistance, and four project proposals were received and reviewed.**

Breakdown of Total Costs for Resources Development Fund Projects

The total cost of the 68 projects that have been approved for Resources Development Fund assistance is approximately \$204,541,000.

Of this amount, the Development Fund has provided \$81,514,000 (40%), federal programs \$68,640,000 (34%) and local entities \$54,390,000 (26%).

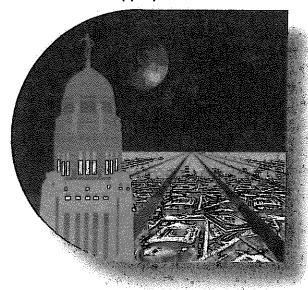




Resources Development Fund Financial History

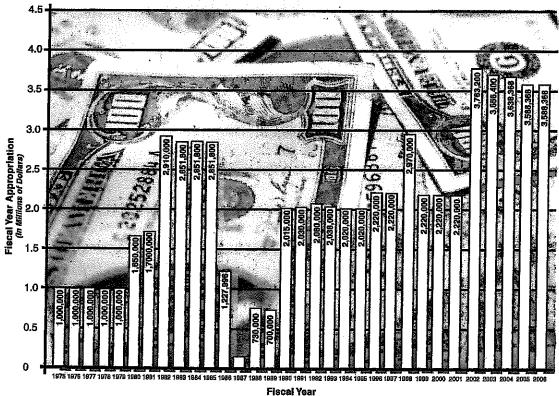

Project Status

As of June 30, 2006, a total of 54 projects that received financial assistance from the Resources Development Fund have been completed. Three other funded projects (School Creek, Deshler, and Weeping Water Site 7g) were suspended by their sponsor prior to land rights acquisition due to unanticipated cost increases and/or public opposition.

It is estimated that approximately \$1,280,500,000 in benefits will accrue from the funded projects during their project life periods (generally 50 years). These benefits can be separated into three categories:

- 1. Flood Reduction/Erosion and Sediment Control \$1,074,900,000 (84%)
- 2. Recreation/Fish and Wildlife \$149,400,000 (12%)
- 3. Ground Water Recharge/Irrigation Water Management \$56,200,0000 (4%)

2000 NRCS and P-MRNRD collaborated to develop a comprehensive Pigeon/Jones (P/J) Creek Watershed Work Plan

September 2000 P-MRNRD Board approved the P/J Watershed Work Plan calling for 20 Erosion Control Dams (including Site #15) and road structures

July 2003 the P-MRNRD awarded a construction contract for the Flood Control/Erosion Control Dam Site #3 near Hubbard

July 28, 2004 the P-MRNRD awarded a contract to Olsson Associates to conduct a Pre-Feasibility Study for P/J Site #15 per Nebraska Resources Development Fund guidelines

January 2005 the P-MRNRD Board voted to submit the Pre-Feasibility Report for Site #15 to the Department of Natural Resources

March 24, 2005 the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Authorized the P-MRNRD to proceed with an application and feasibility report for P/J Site #15

April 25, 2005 the P-MRNRD awarded a contract for P/J Watershed Erosion Control Dams #4, #5, and #14

June 7, 2005 P-MRNRD Board approves an Amendment to P/J Dam Site #15 Professional Services Contract for preparation of NRDF Feasibility Study to Olsson Associates

March, 2006 the P-MRNRD Board approved an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with Dakota County for road construction and realignment and the construction of the South Bluff Road Bridge

July 11, 2007 the Natural Resources Commission approved the P/J Site #15 project NRDF application
