### NATURAL RESOURCES CONSERVATION SERVICE ACTIVITY REPORT within the P-MRNRD DECEMBER 2002

#### CONSERVATION PLANNING AND APPLICATION:

- Mild weather conditions continue to be conducive to earthwork maintenance activities in Burt County. Tekamah FO is currently processing **26** requests for certified wetland determinations regarding drainage maintenance.
- Washington County has received 21 HEL/Wetland determination requests.
- Walthill FO completed **3** wetland determinations and informed a producer of a converted wetland violation in Thurston County.
- South Sioux City FO has received 8 HEL/Wetland determination requests.
- Omaha FO provided soil loss documentation to the NRD pertaining to a Sediment and Erosion complaint.
- Omaha FO wrote one new FSA conservation plan.

#### CONSERVATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS:

- Blair FO received 46 applications for fall construction. 36 have been completed and 30 have been paid. The mild winter weather has encouraged landowners to complete their conservation practices and construction is ongoing in Washington County.
- Dakota County received 2 applications for fall construction. 2060 feet of terraces, 1470 feet of waterways, 615 feet of underground outlets, and 200 feet of storage diversion have been completed.
- Tekamah FO completed **5** terrace systems in December. Summary of Burt County construction activities for 2002 indicates that approximately **26** miles of storage terraces were installed in the county involving **\$348,000** in landowner cost and NRD cost-share commitments.
- Blair FO has received **5** conservation applications for Spring **2003** construction.
- Tekamah FO has received 14 conservation applications for Spring 2003 construction.
- Blair FO has received **28** orders for **7,000** trees to be planted in Spring **2003**. FO staff are visiting sites, and lending assistance with plans and species selection.
- Burt County FO has completed 4 windbreak tree plans for Spring 2003.
- Dakota County has received 3 orders for 150 trees to be planted in Spring 2003.
- Walthill FO completed plans for 4 windbreaks in Thurston County.

### CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM (CRP):

- Burt County FO has received **3** CRP filter strip applications for **41** acres.
- Dakota County FO has 1 completed CRP contract for waterways.
- Omaha FO received 1 application for a grass filter strip. 1 CRP contract for a 4.2 acre grass filter strip was completed.
- Thurston County FO has completed contracts on **3** CRP filter strips and **1** waterway.
- Washington County FO has approved 7 CRP filter and buffer strip applications.

### ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY INCENTIVE PROGRAM (EQIP):

• Diego Ayala assisted Walthill Field Office staff with two producers that have EQIP contracts. Nutrient management, record keeping and interpreting soil analysis were discussed.

### SILVER CREEK AND PIGEON/JONES CREEK WATERSEEDS:

- NRD technicians Dennis Piper and Rod Kinning conducted fall inspections of Silver Creek structures. Maintenance was completed on two miles of the dike on Elk Creek and 12 miles of Pigeon Creek.
- Silver Creek Site 18 has been completed and inspected by NRD/NRCS staff.
- NRCS and NRD staff are working on the easements and bid information for Silver Creek Site **15** to be constructed this year.

### TRIBAL ASSISTANCE:

• Don Atkinson and Walthill FO staff assisted the Winnebago Tribal Agency staff with the following issues: conservation planning activities, fencing on tribal tracts, authorized signatures for FSA CCC forms, aerial photos for tribal use and establishing boundaries/legal descriptions on a tribal homesite.

### WATER QUALITY:

- Burt County completed 2 well abandonments.
- Dakota County had **5** wells to be abandoned. **2** wells were completed.
- Douglas/Sarpy had 9 wells to be abandoned. 3 wells were completed
- Washington County had 12 wells to be abandoned; 1 well was completed.

### **INFORMATION/EDUCATION:**

- Burt County FO staff is participating in a Wildlife Habitat Enhancement informational meeting that is scheduled for March 5,2003. The Cooperative Extension Service is sponsoring the meeting. Representatives from federal, state, and private habitat organizations will be available to explain enhancement concepts, and also discuss programs to aid in increasing habitat quality and development.
- The South Sioux City FO staff provided news items and photos for the NRD Share Page. The following articles were published in the *South* **Sioux** *City* Star – The 2002 Census of Agriculture, The Cost Benefits of a Windbreak, The Lewis and Clark Scenic By-way and The 2003 Midstates Community Development Conference to be held in March. Photos with captions that were used: a constructed terrace system, Americorps volunteer Shelly Tislerics receiving the Nebraska Earth Team Volunteer of the Year Award from Steve Chick, and a mature windbreak in Dakota County.

### MEETINGS:

- P-MRNRD NRCS and NRD Field Office staff attended the 3-day NRCS State All-Employees Meeting at Kearney.
- P-MRNRD NRCS AND NRD Field Office staff attended the Team Meeting at Tekamah. Workload and PRMS reporting were the main topics of discussion.

# A healthy Missouri River

*1- 1-0-3* his new year could be crucial for the health and use of the MissouriRiver.

Among other important challenges, the Army Corps of Engi-

neers could act on a new master manual plan for management of the waterway. That and other decisions being made at the federal, state and local levels will resound well into the future.

The corps will decide — or, by delaying action, make a passive decision — whether it is vital to the health of the river ecosystem, wildlife habitat and endangered species to create a rise in the spring water flow, followed by a summer low period. The federal Fish and Wildlife Service has indicated that is a vital component of river management. Others, including the barge and agricultural industries and the states of Iowa and Missouri, oppose the plan because of potential flooding and disruption of barge traffic.

Of course, the corps' decision (or non-decision) isn't likely to be the lasb word; lawsuits lurk. For instance, American Rivers, The Izaak Walton League and the national and several state Wildlife Federations, including those in Iowa and Nebraska, have given notice that they will take legal action. They say the corps is eiolating laws in its management of the river.

The Endangered Species Act and the Flood ControlAct of **1942**, among others, underlie the possible suit, which cites damage to species such as the pallid sturgeon. American Rivers has contended that the water-release schedule now in place illegally maximizes commercial

The other side of the issue is represented on the lawsuit front, too. Just last month, a consortium of agricultural and barge interests and others who earn their living via the Missouri River indicated it would sue because river levels fell last July, disrupting barge traffic. The *corps* allowed the decline because Fish and Wildlife stopped water releases so that the nests of two species of endangered shorebirds would remain undisturbed.

The Coalition to Protect the Missouri River contends that navigation was halted and its members suffered \$7 million in economic losses. Director Randy Asbury calledit "an economic catastrophe," and said that uncertainty about future water levels is causing continuing problems.

The corps has said it will not engineer a spring rise this year because of drought conditions upstream. Since arise is required, researchers have said, only once every three years, that appears to be an appropriate decision. Science is the key to this water-level dilemma. Decisions based on science, rather than on political expediency or pressure tactics, will likely hold up in court.

Potentially lengthy court action seems practically inevitable. If <u>so</u>, that's too bad. The river's <u>habitat</u>. <u>species</u> and ecosystem need **protec**tion soonerrather thanlater.
